

SIYUM BECHORIM SERVICES FAST OF THE FIRST BORN

Friday morning, April 15, 2022 • Morning Zoom Minyan

A first born (whether of the mother or the father) is commanded to fast on the day before Pesach in commemoration of the deliverance of the First Born of Israel from the 10th plague which killed the Egyptian First Born Sons. The day before means the day on which the First Seder falls which this year is Friday, April 15. The requirement to fast is waived, however, if the first born is present at what is termed a Seudat Mitzvah—a festive meal which follows the performance of certain Mitzvot (i.e. Brit Milah, Baby Naming). Since it isn't always possible to arrange for a Simcha to fall out on the right day, the custom developed to

have a "SIYUM" on that day. A Siyum is a public completion of the study of a section of Rabbinic literature and it is followed by a meal of celebration. The first born who is present is permitted to eat. This effectively negates the fast for the rest of the day. The SIYUM will take place at during our morning Zoom services on Friday morning, April 15.

SALE OF CHAMETZ

According to Jewish tradition, a Jew should not have in his/her possession any food which contains leaven or which has been in contact with leaven, such as bread, rolls, biscuits, crackers, ice cream, candy, all cereals, dry peas, dry beans, Rye, Scotch and all forms of grain alcohol. Since it is almost impossible to divest ourselves of all Chametz, the Rabbis developed a tradition of "selling Chametz." We sell the Chametz in our possession (which is kept in a closet that is closed throughout the Passover holiday) to a non-Jew and it reverts back to us at the end of Pesach.

Those who wish to have their Chametz sold can either fill out the form to the right which authorizes our Rabbis to sell the Chametz for you or stop by the Synagogue and see one of the Rabbis. Remember, you need not remove the Chametz from your home simply put it in a closet or pantry which is closed and not opened during Pesach.

It is customary to make a donation for the Selling of Chametz which will be used for Tzedakah purposes during the Passover season. Please make your check out to Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. Deadline is April 14.

This fund is call "MAOT CHITTIM" and means literally "Money for Wheat." The wheat, of course, refers to Matzah. Today there are many organizations which see to it that Jews who either cannot afford a Seder or who have no idea what a Seder is (Russian immigrants for instance) are taken care of before Pesach. Many individuals contact our Synagogue requesting help each year. We have our own "Maot Chittim" fund here at Beth Torah which enables us to respond to both the organizations and the individuals who make requests of us.
